North Northamptonshire elections - Key dates

Residents are being encouraged to get ready for elections taking place in North Northamptonshire. This follows the publishing of the Notice of Election on Friday 7 March.

On Thursday 1 May, the North Northamptonshire Council elections and Town and Parish Council elections will take place. These elections will be the first under changes to local government boundaries and wards, which will see a reduction in the number of councillors from 78 to 68, and some residents voting in a new or different ward. Due to the changes in boundaries, your polling station might differ from the last time you voted, so please double check your poll card when it arrives. Poll cards are due to start landing on doorsteps across North Northamptonshire from next week.

Key dates:

- **Friday 11 April:** [Register to vote](#). If you have recently moved home or changed your name, you may need to update your details to ensure you can take part.
- **Monday 14 April:** [Apply for a postal vote](#).
- **Wednesday 23 April:** [Apply for a proxy vote](#).
- **Wednesday 23 April:** [Apply for ID to vote \(called a 'Voter Authority Certificate'\)](#) if you don't have an accepted form of ID.

Anyone wishing to vote in person now needs to bring acceptable photographic ID, an Anonymous Electors Document or a Voter Authority Certificate. A list of [Acceptable ID](#) can be found on our website. Applicants for Voter Authority Certificates must be registered to vote beforehand.

The Town and Parish Council elections results will be announced on Saturday 3 May.

North Northamptonshire Council allocated £120,000 in grant funding between 46 local charities and non-profit organisations

North Northamptonshire Council has allocated £120,000 towards local charities and non-profit organisations whose community work is improving the quality of life of residents. A wide variety of grants were allocated including those that will benefit children and young people, projects for physical and mental health, projects that benefit green spaces and to improve community connections.

Our Stronger Communities Team received 100 applications before Christmas and funded 46 of those organisations up to £5,000. Applicants were required to demonstrate that funding will be used to support one or more of the council's six key commitments as outlined in the council's Corporate Plan.

Charities and non-profit organisations were urged to bid for grants of up to £5,000 each and had to demonstrate that their applications benefitted the wider community and supported the strategic aims and objectives of the council.

The council's Grants Funding Panel were responsible for assessing and awarding the grants of up to £2,500. For those over that figure, the Oversight Board made the final decision.

750 trees planted in new micro forest for Wellingborough

A new micro forest has been established in Wellingborough, following a collaborative effort that saw 750 native trees planted at Castlefields Park last week. The council partnered with staff from [Tomorrow's Forests](#) (a tree planting and habitat restoration company) and volunteers from the [Wellingborough Eco Group](#) to bring this ambitious project to life.

This initiative was made possible through funding awarded as part of the Coronation Living Heritage Fund which was established to mark the Coronation of King Charles III. The funding has covered essential materials, resources and aftercare to help the micro forest establish and thrive for future generations. The council has been awarded £27,765 for the project, which also includes two other micro forests planted last year - one at Croyland Primary School in Wellingborough and the other in Kettering. The funding has been allocated for the careful selection and preparation of the sites, as well as the ongoing maintenance of the trees over the next three years.

A micro forest is a dense, fast-growing native woodland, about the size of a tennis court, using the methods pioneered by Japanese botanist Akira Miyawaki. Dense planting speeds up growth, increases resilience and improves survival rates of the woodland, producing a fully efficient woodland in 20 years, compared to the usual 100 years.

Micro forests provide a home for butterflies, birds, bees and other wildlife, and a space for people to connect with and learn about nature. Additionally, they help improve air quality and reduce pollution in urban areas.

Tree planting schemes like this one also enable volunteers to get directly involved and make a difference in their communities. Community groups, volunteers and schools will assist with the future maintenance of the Castlefields Park micro forest.

Smokers in North Northamptonshire signposted to local stop smoking services

Smokers in North Northamptonshire are being directed to local services to help them quit smoking for good.

Two in three long-term smokers die from smoking. Smoking causes 64,000 deaths in England each year. In North Northamptonshire, around 14.8% of adults smoke.

Our Stop Smoking Service offers:

- A dedicated stop smoking service, providing up to 12 weeks of free behavioural support.
- Tips and advice on how to stop smoking.
- Face-to-face or telephone appointments.
- Appointments available Monday to Friday across North Northamptonshire.
- A free course of nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) which may include an e-cigarette starter kit and 12-week supply of e-liquid.

According to recent data, 95% of ex-smokers experience positive changes within just two weeks of quitting, including increased energy (45%), feeling healthier (42%), and improved breathing (42%).

The average smoker could save around £2,338 per year by quitting smoking (The economic impact of smoking - ASH).

Temporary road closures for VE Day street parties

Victory in Europe (VE Day), which takes place on Thursday 8 May, marks the Allied victory in Europe.

This year is the 80th anniversary of VE Day and it will be commemorated with a series of events and celebrations that will share stories of the Second World War generation. Street parties will also be held across the country.
